



We bow in worship, to Your Holy Cross, O Master and we glorify Your Holy Resurrection!

SUNDAY OF THE VENERATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

Today is called the Sunday of "The Veneration of the Life-Giving Cross". The Cross, adorned with flowers and greenery, is solemnly brought in procession to the center of the church and remains there for the entire week -- with a special rite of veneration following each service. The central theme emphasizes Christ's Glorious Victory over Sin, and not His sufferings, which is reflected in the Canon of the day, taken from the Paschal Service, "The Day of the Holy Resurrection."

The meaning of all this is clear. We have come to the midpoint of the Great Fast. And on one hand, the physical and spiritual effort of fasting, if it is serious and consistent, begins to weigh on us as our fatigue becomes more evident; we are in need of help and encouragement. On the other hand, having endured up to this point, we begin to see the end of our pilgrimage, anticipating the encounter of Our Lord's Glorious Resurrection growing in intensity. Lent is our self-crucifixion and our experience, limited as it is, must reflect Christ's commandment: "If any man would come after me, let him deny his very self and take up his cross and follow me." (Mark 8:34) It is precisely *His* Cross, from which we derive our strength and determination in carrying our own cross, in imitation of Him.

The Life-Giving Cross is presented to us as *the* Source of refreshment and comfort, and a remembrance of our Lord's Passion.... We are like those following a long cruel path, who become tired, and upon seeing a lush tree, sit in its shade, resting for a while and then rejuvenated, continue on our journey; likewise today, fasting is difficult and requires much effort, thus the Cross is planted in our midst plainly to refresh us and make us stronger and more courageous for the remaining task....

Another example of this is: when a king visits his people, at first his banner and symbols appear, then he himself comes, rejoicing over his victory and fills those under him with joy; likewise, our Lord Jesus Christ, who is about to show us His Victory over Death, appears to us in the glory of His Holy Resurrection, and sends to us in advance His scepter, the royal symbol - The Life-Giving Cross which fills us too with joy and makes us ready to meet, inasmuch as it is possible for us, the King Himself, to give Him glory in His Victory.... All this in the midst of the Great Fast, which can become bitter and hard..... and lo, Christ appears to us who are as if we were in a desert, to lead us up to the Spiritual Jerusalem through the Holy Resurrection.... for the Cross is the Tree of Life - that same Tree that was planted in the middle of Paradise; and for this reason, the Church plants It in the midst of the Holy Fast, remembering both Adam's bliss before the Fall and his Agony when he was deprived of it through sin; and also remembering that partaking of this Tree, we no longer Die, but are granted Life....

Now, refreshed and reassured, we boldly continue on and endure the rest of the Great Fast....

Exaltation of the Holy Cross

O most venerable cross of the Lord, the angels surround you with joy at your elevation today. You raise up those who had fallen and had been delivered to death for having eaten of the forbidden tree. Therefore, we praise you without lips, begging for sanctification, saying: Exalt Christ our gracious God, O you nations, and adore his divine footsteps forever.

Hidden in the earth as a divine treasure, the Cross of the giver of life now appeared in the heavens to the godly emperor, and its inscription spiritually signified his victory over the enemy. Rejoicing with faith and love, he was inspired by God and hastened to raise on high the Cross that he had seen in his vision. With great zeal he brought it forth from the bosom of the earth for the deliverance of the world and the salvation of our souls.

O most holy Cross of Christ, you are our powerful protection. Sanctify us by your might that I may venerate and glorify you in faith and love.

O cross, you are the radiant sign among the stars. In prophecy you have revealed the sign of victory to the godly king; and when his mother Helena found you, she displayed you in the sight of all the world. Today the choirs of the faithful shout aloud as they raise you on high: Enlighten us by your brightness, O life-giving and all-venerable cross. Make us holy by your might; strengthen us by your exaltation, for you are raised up against our enemies.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; now and unto the ages of ages. Amen.

Come all you people, let us venerate the blessed cross of the Lord through which eternal justice came to us. He who deceived Adam, the first man, was conquered by a tree, and the same who fettered the holy creation by his cunning has been cast down into nothingness. The venom of the serpent has been washed away by the divine blood of Christ. The curse of their rightful sentence was lifted when the just Christ was condemned unjustly. By God's plan, death that had come from a tree would be conquered by a tree, and suffering would be healed by the suffering of the Lord. Glory to the active presence of Your providence in our lives, O Christ, our King. Through it You have brought salvation for all, for You are gracious and the Lover of mankind.
