Mercy Is a Verb

There is more to spirituality than walking in the woods or watching waves break on the shore. At the invitation of Jesus, Peter, James and John "leave everything." In the parable of the Prodigal Son, we hear the young man say that he will "get up" and go back to his Father. Even monks are very active in the quiet of their cloisters. Trappist monks, for example, rise in the small hours of the morning to begin their day—a day during which they gather seven times to offer prayers for the world. What's the lesson here? C. S. Lewis points out in his *Reflections on the Psalms* that the "goats" are cast out not because of sinful things they did, but for things they did NOT do.



Recently, Pope Francis prayed the Angelus with the crowd in Saint Peter's Square and told them, "In this Holy Year of Mercy we are called to comfort those who are despairing because of their sinfulness, feeling unworthy before the Lord and defeated by their mistakes, by speaking to them the very words of Jesus: 'Do not be afraid. The Father's mercy is greater than all your sins!'" To be a true disciple means to walk in the very footsteps of the Master, actively doing His same work in ministering to those in the world, along the path Christ showed us.

Let us pray: Lord, remind us always that our mercy must be shown in actions, not merely words.

Take a look at what St. John Chrysostom ask of us today:

"Do you fast? Then feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, visit the sick, do not forget the imprisoned, have pity on the tortured, comfort those who grieve and who weep, be merciful, humble, kind, calm, patient, sympathetic, forgiving, reverent, truthful and pious,

so that God might accept your fasting and might plentifully grant you the fruits of repentance."

St. John Chrysostom

Today's Gospel reminds me of a similar yet more intense encounter with Jesus which I would like to reflect on. It is about the Canaanite woman who begged Jesus for His help, saying "Lord, have pity on me, for my daughter is tormented by an evil spirit". In some special way, she, though a pagan Canaanite outsider and not a Jew, implicitly trusted in Christ and saw supreme healing power in Him. Her plead could be really summed up in these words: "O, Son of God, deliver my daughter, who is made in the image of Your Majesty from the clutches of the Evil One, so that she may be granted an inheritance with You, and become once again *the* dwelling place of Your glory, for You came into the world to save the image which Your hands have created from eternity."

What follows is peculiar yet quite interesting and it's in how Jesus responded to her. He completely ignored her, for as the Gospel says, "He did not answer her at all." Surely, this would make us wonder about God and even pose such questions: How often do we bring our needs to God seeking help from Him, and we hear nothing? Why is it, that He does not at times respond and answer us, nor gives us any sign, or plainly speaking, why does He do this? We may even be provoked to shout at and argue with Him, in desperation, sometimes in anger to His silence, and yet still nothing comes our way. We may even want to give-up at this point.

However in this encounter, we see that the Canaanite woman does not. Actually, she approached closer to Him, though the disciples wanted Him to dismiss her, by boldly kneeling before Him and said, "Lord, help me." Still Christ did nothing and told her flatly, "No." This jolted her to become even more persistent, and ever so selflessly and humbly before Him, she awaited the sought after and anticipated positive response of healing by Him; healing not for herself, but rather for her beloved daughter. You would think that by now He would have healed her, right? And yet still most unusually the response is nothing. Worse yet, Jesus went so far as to liken her to a dog, by telling her, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." You wonder if she was beginning to feel totally ignored and abandoned by Him, and would just simply leave and go home?

Surprisingly, she did not. After suffering Jesus' derogatory rebuke, she came back at Him once again with these profound words, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table." In other words, she said, "I am not giving up; rather, I will take whatever little You will offer to me in total gratitude." And, at this finally, He openly responded to her prayer on account of her great faith, and instantly healed her daughter. Reflecting on this same encounter, St. John Chrysostom wrote that Jesus knew from the very start that she would not relent in imploring Him, and in fact, purposely went through this whole rigor with her, in order to "exhibit her high self-command and utmost faith in and humility before God." She lowered herself so deeply before Him, knowing with great confidence that even "crumbs" given by the Master would be most acceptable and welcome, even if it meant for her to be considered lower than any child or animal. (Homily LII, on St. Matthew XV). She knew very well that as long as she was in the very presence of

THE Master, He would provide for her needs. What boldness! What confidence! What faith-filled servitude before The Lord!

Like her, so too must we be committed to Christ with our entire being, and be persistent and tenacious, even stubborn and unwavering before our God, with a deep, steadfast and joyful peace as she demonstrated. Our Lord may and will similarly act with us to test the strength of our faith. Our response must be by redoubling our faith in Him, and drawing closer to Him and in pure sincerity continue worshipping and acknowledging Him ONLY as True Power and all along in stillness await His help; no different than Abraham, who pleaded five times with the Lord to spare Sodom and Gomorrah on behalf of the few righteous people that remained among the abominable sinners; and no different like Jacob who struggled and "wrestled" with God Who later rewarded him for his effort.

The question we are being asked today is: do we give up on God in times when He decides not to answer us quickly? NO! What He is doing is calling us to a deeper level of trusting in Him; that whatever answer He may give us, and whenever He chooses to, if He even does at all, we can be assured that He does so to build our character, to make us stronger, to deepen our appreciation of His Majesty and our gratitude in everything He provides for us every day. God's silence often is the cross road where we, in loving patience while suffering His absence, come to eventually know that He is ever with us and will not refuse us in our needs. His stillness leads us deep within our inner heart and soul, to come and meet us and heal us. We become one with Him – the One Who made Himself one with us, so that in and through Christ, we may offer our very selves to His Father, in behalf of all and for all and for the salvation of all. In response to His loving mercy, we firmly state, "May He-Who-Is, Almighty God, be blessed, the One Who delivers us His servants, from all evil and rebellious spirits. And like the Canaanite woman, let us boldly exclaim: "Have mercy on us, O Lord and save us!

May we be deemed worthy of the great gift of Paradise along with all the Saints, and not be numbered among the wicked destined for eternal sufferings and torment in Hell at the Awesome Judgment Seat of Christ. Let us pray the Kondak Prayer in honor of St. John Climacus (The Ladder) whose memory we celebrate today: "You offered us your teachings as fruits of everlasting freshness, to sweeten the hearts of those who receive them with humility. O blessed and wise John, they are the rungs of a ladder, leading the souls of those who honor you from earth to Eternal Glory in Heaven!
